

Course Leader and Lecturers

Marie Maguire (Course Leader) wrote *Men, Women, Passion & Power: Gender Issues in Psychotherapy* (revised 2nd edition Routledge 2004), and co-edited 2 other books including *Psychotherapy with Women* (Macmillan 1997). She was on the Guild of Psychotherapists Training Committee for 17 years and has a private practice as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and supervisor in South London'.

Ruth Barnett, a teacher for 19 years and psychoanalytic psychotherapist for 30, now supervises, teaches and gives talks for many different organisations, often applying psychoanalytic insights to social and political issues. She offers specialised trauma, Holocaust and anti-racism seminars and also has a particular interest in Europe-wide racist discrimination against Travellers and Gypsies.

Linda Buckingham trained at The Tavistock Centre and is now a Lead Child Psychotherapist in Lewisham. She was on The Guild of Psychotherapists Training Committee for 12 years and has a special interest in the philosophical underpinnings of psychoanalytical theory. She has written many articles for psychoanalytic journals including, as Cunningham R. (1991), "When is a Pervert Not a Pervert?" *BJP* 8, 48-70.

Alan Corbett trained at the Guild of Psychotherapists and the Portman Clinic and was previously Director of Respond, and National Clinical Director of the CARI (Children at Risk in Ireland) Foundation. He works in private practice in Dublin and London, consults to organisations working in the field of psychotherapy, training, sexual trauma and intellectual disability and is a lecturer on the Trinity University MSc in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy.

Frank Lowe is a Consultant Social Worker and Psychoanalytic Psychotherapist at the Tavistock Clinic where he teaches on a number of courses and is the Course Organiser of a CPD course on 'Working with Black Children and Families in CAMHS'. He chairs Thinking Space: a monthly learning forum at the Tavistock which explores issues of race and culture in therapy. Frank also runs a private practice as a Psychotherapist and Management Consultant.

Jenny Marsh's theoretical and clinical roots are Jungian but her experience of teaching and supervising in The Guild of Psychotherapists since the 1980s has broadened her orientation. She has served on The Guild Council and was Chair of the Training Committee until 2007.

Lesley Murdin is a teacher, lecturer & supervisor with a psychoanalytic psychotherapy practice in Cambridge. Her books include *How Much is Enough?* (2000) on endings in psychotherapy, *Setting Out* (2000) on beginnings and *Understanding Transference* (in press). An Honorary Fellow of UKCP, she was named among Evening Standard's top twenty therapists in London.

Christopher Scanlon is a Consultant Psychotherapist, Organisational Consultant & Training Analyst at the Institute of Group Analysis (London). He has a particular interest in those who are excluded/rejected from society including the homeless, 'dangerous' & 'disordered'.

Joseph Schwartz, an attachment-based psychoanalytic psychotherapist at the Bowlby Centre is editor of the journal *ATTACHMENT: New Directions in Psychotherapy and Relational Psychoanalysis*. His books include the award winning *Einstein for Beginners* (with Mike McGuinness) and *Cassandra's Daughter: A History of Psychoanalysis in Europe and America*. A veteran of the US civil rights movement, he has a long-standing interest in how our social arrangements affect the inner world.

Jean White is a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and supervisor, practicing full-time in London for 30 years. She lectures widely, both in London (including the BJP Annual Lecture 2007) and internationally. She has published many journal papers and her book, *Generation: Preoccupations and Conflicts in Contemporary Psychoanalysis* (Routledge 2006), is a detailed exposition of the implications of psychoanalytic pluralism.

Chris Williams trained with the WPF and the Association of Jungian Analysts. For over twenty years he has supervised counselors and psychotherapists individually and in groups within many different settings. Most recently he has been involved in working in St. Petersburg supervising experienced psychotherapists seeking a Jungian perspective. He has a private practice in Bath.

Anne Worthington is a member of The Guild of Psychotherapists Training Committee. She teaches psychoanalysis at Middlesex University and practices as a psychoanalyst in South London. She is a member of the Centre for Freudian Analysis and Research and The College of Psychoanalysts – UK.
